12	On or about November 7, 2023, STEVEN POLONSKY, a certified peace officer	
13	with the Bremerton Police Department (BPD), separated from his employment with the

15	representations in the practice of being a peace officer, subjecting his certification to	
16	mandatory revocation under RCW 43.101.105(2)(d).	
17	Additionally, between approximately February 2021 and June 2023, POLONSKY	
18	engaged in conduct and/or a pattern of conduct that failed to meet the ethical and	
19	professional standards required of a peace officer and/or disrupted, diminished, or	
20	otherwise jeopardized public trust or co	onfidence in the law enforcement profession.
21	POLONSKY'S peace officer certifi	cation is subject to discipline under
22	RCW 43.101.105(3)(3)(j)(iv) and (3)(k). T	The circumstances are as follows:
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COUNT I

On or about June 28, 2023, during an Internal Affairs (IA) interview concerning allegations of misconduct against POLONSKY at issue in BPD's IA investigation No. 23-06, POLONSKY knowingly made misleading, deceptive, untrue, or fraudulent representations about the nature of his interactions with Kitsap County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Joeseph Lombardi and/or about being notified of his obligation to comply with a subpoena to appear as a law enforcement witness for a criminal trial. POLONSKY's false and misleading statements violated BPD's honesty policy (BPD IA 23-06). POLONSKY separated from the BPD on or about November 7, 2023. POLONSKY'S peace officer certification is subject to mandatory revocation under RCW 43.101.105(2)(d).

AND/OR

COUNT II

On or around February 9, 2021, POLONSKY engaged in conduct that failed to meet the ethical and professional standards of a peace officer and/or disrupted, diminished, or otherwise jeopardized public trust or confidence in law enforcement when, while on duty, he engaged in unprofessional and disrespectful behavior towards a tow truck driver, which violated BPD's policy governing conduct toward the public. (BPD IA No. C21-06). POLONSKY'S peace officer certification is subject to discipline under RCW 43.101.105(3)(j)(iv).

AND/OR

COUNT III

On or around January 25, 2023, POLONSKY engaged in conduct that failed to meet the ethical and professional standards of a peace officer and/or disrupted, diminished, or otherwise jeopardized public trust or confidence in law enforcement when, while on duty and in uniform, he entered the place of employment of a citizen

who previously filed a complaint about him and made disparaging, retaliatory, and/or slanderous remarks about her to a coworker. POLONSKY'S misconduct violated BPD's policy governing conduct unbecoming a BPD employee (BPD IA 23-02). POLONSKY'S peace officer certification is subject to discipline under RCW 43.101.105(3)(j)(iv).

AND/OR

COUNT IV

Between approximately January 25, 2023, and June 28, 2023, POLONSKY engaged in conduct that failed to meet the ethical and professional standards of a peace officer and/or disrupted, diminished, or otherwise jeopardized public trust or confidence in law enforcement during preparations for a criminal trial in which he had been subpoenaed to testify as a law enforcement witness and when interviewed by IA investigators. Specifically, POLONSKY engaged in unethical and unprofessional conduct: (1) on or around January 25, 2023, when he impeded a defense interview by repeatedly answering questions only by reading verbatim from his police report, despite being asked for his personal recollection of events; and/or (2) on or around May 11, 2023, by communicating disrespectfully and unprofessionally during a phone call with Kitsap County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Joeseph Lombardi, including by berating Mr. Lombardi and using profanity; and/or (3) on or around June 28, 2023, by engaging in the misconduct described in Count I. POLONSKY'S misconduct violated BPD's policies governing professionalism, conduct unbecoming a BPD employee. conduct toward the public, and honesty, as well as the City of Bremerton's civil service rule governing offensive conduct and language (BPD IA 23-06). POLONSKY'S peace officer certification is subject to discipline under RCW 43.101.105(3)(j)(iv).

AND/OR

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COUNT V

On or around May 16, 2023, during a training session for a new law enforcement records management system, POLONSKY engaged in conduct that failed to meet the ethical and professional standards of a peace officer and/or disrupted, diminished, or otherwise jeopardized public trust or confidence in law enforcement when he behaved disrespectfully and unprofessionally toward a training instructor, including using profanity and other abusive language and raising his voice toward the instructor. POLONSKY'S conduct violated BPD's policies governing professionalism, conduct unbecoming a BPD employee, conduct toward the public, and City of Bremerton's civil service rule governing offensive conduct and language (BPD IA 23-05). POLONSKY'S peace officer certification is subject to discipline under RCW 43.101.105(3)(j)(iv).

AND/OR

COUNT VI

Between approximately February 2021 and June 2023, POLONSKY engaged in a pattern of conduct that failed to meet the ethical and professional standards required of a peace officer and/or disrupted, diminished, or otherwise jeopardized public trust or confidence in the law enforcement profession when he engaged in a series of actions that reflected inappropriate and unprofessional conduct toward members of the public, as described in Counts II-V. POLONSKY'S peace officer certification is subject to discipline under RCW 43.101.105(3)(j)(iv).

AND/OR

2	On or about November 7, 2023, POLONSKY separated from his employment	
3	with the BPD after engaging in the misconduct described in Counts II-VI. POLONSKY'S	
4	peace officer certification is subject to discipline under RCW 43.101.105(3)(k).
